Applying as Pre-Nursing

New Freshman, Transfer Students & Second Degree Students

- Submit an application to UW-Parkside, at www.uwp.edu/apply/instructions.cfm, by July 1 for a Fall start and December 1 for a Spring start.
- Accepted students must register for and attend an orientation where you can declare Pre-Nursing as your major.
- ALL students start as Pre-Nursing before they apply to the Professional Nursing Major

Current UWM Students (change of major)

Inquiring Transfer Students

- Must have a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution with a minimum 2.0 GPA on a 4.0 scale.
- Must submit application to UW-Parkside at www.apply.wisconsin.edu by July
 1 for a Fall start and December 1 for a Spring start.
- Should send unofficial transcripts to advisor then schedule an appointment via Calendly https://calendly.com/uwpnursingadvisorappoitment.

Applying to the Professional Nursing Major

Prerequisites

- Math Competency (Placement score of 30+ or Math 102/111 or equivalent with "C" or higher)
- GPA requirements at the time of application <u>and</u> prior to starting the professional major:
 - Minimum pre-nursing GPA: 2.75 (calculated based on 14 classes in table to right)
 - Minimum science GPA: 2.75 (calculated based on seven bolded classes in table to right)
- Must have at least a "C" (2.0) in each nursing prerequisite course
- Repeat Policy:
 - Nursing prerequisite courses with a "C-" or lower are considered a failure and need to be repeated.
 - A prerequisite course may only be repeated one time.
 - No more than **two** prerequisite courses can be repeated.
- Nursing prerequisite courses may be taken after application is submitted, but courses must be completed with a "C" or higher, maintain the minimum required GPAs, and be completed in the intended semester by the start of the professional major, if admitted.

Application Process

- Applications to the Professional Nursing Major are evaluated with a holistic admission process. A rubric and link for the application can be found online at uwm.edu/nursing.
- Items Considered in Application:
 - Academics
 - Work/Volunteer/Leadership Experience
 - No minimum hour expectation. Committee looks for consistency and a pattern of balancing volunteering with school and work. Healthcare experiences recommended.
 - On-Campus essay and series of short interviews

Frequently Asked Questions

How does the UWM/UWP Consortia Nursing Program Work?

The nursing major at Parkside is offered in partnership UW-Milwaukee. Students are admitted to Parkside and complete the UWM College of Nursing pre-nursing and Professional nursing curriculum on Parkside's campus. You do not have to go to UWM. When students graduate, they are actually graduates of UW-Milwaukee. For this reason, each nursing student is responsible for meeting all UW-Milwaukee requirements. Successful completion of the pre-requisites and professional major courses require full-time Monday-Friday daytime availability as the nursing program does not offer online or evening courses. There is no part-time program for the UWM/UWP Nursing Consortia.

How do I meet with my academic advisor?

Use the Navigate student app to schedule an appointment or ask about walk-in hours. You can also e-mail your assigned advisor at their information listed on the front page of this packet.

How long are my science credits good for?

All credit for required courses must have been earned in the ten years preceding beginning the nursing major. Consult with your advisor to discuss your options if your classes are outside of this timeframe.

Do I need to take a foreign language?

If you have successfully completed two years of the same foreign language in high school, then you have completed the UWM/ SON foreign language requirement. If you did not complete these two years or if English is your second language, see your advisor to discuss options for completing the UWM foreign language requirement. If you hold a prior degree or started your college coursework prior to Fall 1999, you are exempt from this requirement.

How many general education requirement courses do I need?

GER-Art: 3 cr

GER—Humanities: 6 cr

Electives: 0-4 cr (must have 120 credits to graduate)

You can find a listing of the courses that fulfill the UWM GER requirements at UWP from your advisor.

Can I take pre-nursing courses at another campus and transfer them in?

Yes. Many prerequisite courses have equivalents at other school. Be sure to contact your academic advisor to ensure that you're taking appropriate courses. Schedule an appointment or e-mail your assigned advisor.

Can I repeat a course if I'm not happy with my grade?

Prior to the start of the professional major, courses may be repeated only once and with no more than two total repeats. Grades of "C-" or lower MUST be replaced by grades of "C" or higher however, repeats of courses which have been passed with a grade of "C" or higher do not count against the repeat rules. The higher grade is then calculated in your nursing GPA if done by the clinical application deadline.

Is the nursing program competitive?

Yes. We do not have enough clinical spots for every student, so you must apply to continue into the professional major. This usually occurs during the sophomore year, but you can apply any semester as long as the prerequisite courses will be completed by the beginning of the major coursework. At UWP we accept 40 students in the Fall semester. Applications are reviewed based on pre-nursing and science GPA, leadership/work/volunteer, etc. experience, a series of short interviews, and an on-site essay.

What happens if I'm not accepted into the major?

You can meet with your assigned professional nursing advisor to get feedback on your application. Based on the strengths and weaknesses of your application, your advisor will discuss options for retaking courses, gaining more volunteer experience, or improving writing skills. Most students will decide to apply again the following semester, but some will decide to switch majors or transfer elsewhere.

Do I have to be CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant) certified?

A CNA license is not required for acceptance into the program. It can be a useful experience for exploring the healthcare field and gaining familiarity with the profession. If interested, you have the opportunity to sit for CNA licensure after your junior year in the program.
